


Nursery Curriculum Newsletter

Autumn 2019





We place a great emphasis on developing good literacy skills in your young learners so much of our teaching is based around storybooks. The stories we will cover this term are: Owl Babies, The Enormous Turnip, Room on the Broom, Nursery Rhymes and The Gingerbread Man. We also have a few themed weeks planned. These include 'Ditch the Dummy' and 'Christmas is Coming'.



Top Tips.....

Name EVERYTHING, including shoes, with a permanent marker pen.
Leave toys at home; they may get lost, broken or 'borrowed' in Nursery.

When buying new clothes look for easy fastenings; elastic and Velcro are easier than buttons, buckles or laces.

Keep an eye on their health. It's common for children to catch more colds and mild illnesses when they first begin Nursery as they mix more and build their natural immunity. Plenty of sleep, a heathy diet and lots of cuddles help.

Nursery dinners

Unfortunately, universal free school meals are not available to Nursery children and cost £1.75 a day. You may be entitled to apply for free school meals if you receive any kind of benefits. Please ask at the office.

What are we learning this term?

Communication and language / speaking and listening

We will be teaching the children to 'tune in'. To listen carefully when others are speaking, take their turn to speak and respond appropriately. Older Nursery children will be learning to identify words that rhyme and hear syllables within words.

You could, introduce some 'quiet time' at home. Turn off the TV/IPad and have a conversation. Discourage your child from 'butting in' when you are speaking. Check if they are listening by questioning them about what's just been said.

Literacy / English

We will be teaching the children essential early reading and early writing skills.

We encourage you to read a story to your child every night. Allow them to draw, colour and paint both large scale and small.

Mathematical development

We will be teaching the children to 'rote count'. This is saying number names in order. They will also learn to count amounts accurately by touching each object and saying one number. The children will become familiar with shapes and the language of measures. Older Nursery children will be recognising and ordering numerals forwards to ten.

You can play games which involve numbers and counting, point out numbers in the environment and count whenever possible, such as when climbing the stairs to bed!

PSHE

We will be encouraging children to make lots of new friends, to share resources with others, and play cooperatively in a group.

You could arrange 'play dates' with new friends. Ensure children use words not force when sharing at home, especially with siblings! We teach the children to say 'Please can I have that when you've finished' rather than grab.

Physical

We provide lots of opportunities to play outside that involve climbing, balancing, jumping as well as moving in different ways, such as on scooters, bikes and two legs!

Creative development

We will be encouraging children to develop their ideas and imagination through role-play, small world play, painting, model making, music and movement. You could play games such as 'shop', 'doctors', or 'tea party'. You don't need lots of toys, just lots of imagination!

Understanding of the world

We will be looking at the weather and seasonal changes. Talking about our families and the communities we belong to and learning to use different types of technology.

You could practise learning the days of the week and the months of the year together.




Please note that the Nursery door is unlocked at 8.45am every day, including Wednesday morning. On Wednesday afternoon the Nursery door is unlocked at 12 midday for children arriving in the afternoon. We regret that we are unable to allow children inside before these times as we wait for additional staff to finish their duties in school and come into Nursery to guard the outside door. This is for the increased safety of your children so please support us by timing your arrival accordingly. In poor weather we will do our best to open the Nursery gate so you may shelter under the canopy until the door is opened. Thank you.

Wonderful Wednesdays

Mrs Taylor is the teacher in Nursery every Wednesday whilst Mrs Hindmarch works out of the classroom planning, preparing and assessing for Nursery.

As Wednesday is the only day of the week that all children attend Nursery at some point we use this day to offer extra special activities so that nobody misses the fun! Our 'Wonderful Wednesday' activities are baking, PE, and Forest Schools (outdoor learning). We also try to organise special events on a Wednesday, again so that everyone is included. The groups experience these activities on a rota basis. The children do not need any special equipment on these days as everything is provided. They may wish to bring their own wellies and leave them on their peg should they be taken outdoors, although we do have wellies to borrow, and please however bring a coat. The children will be asked to remove shoes, socks and jumpers during PE, (for safety reasons) so please take this into account when choosing clothes to wear on Wednesdays, (tights and laces are particularly troublesome!) The children are encouraged to bring their baking home to share with you, although we cannot guarantee this as temptation is sometimes too great!





Our School Library

Your child has the splendid opportunity to borrow and exchange books from our Nursery library. All books are labelled "Nursery library book" and we ask that you take care of the book borrowed and remember to return it. If possible please provide a 'book bag' to keep the books clean and dry. Book bags should be left on the child's peg for easy access.

Children change their Library books with Mrs Schofield on a given day which is written on the front of their reading record book. Please write in this book to help us keep a record of your child's interest in books and their passion for reading. At the end of the year these reading record books are passed on to the next teacher.

Children who share stories with an adult on a regular basis do find learning to read easier.



















Am I eligible?

You, and any partner, must each expect to earn (on average) at least £125 per week (equal to 16 hours at the National Minimum or Living Wage).

If you, or your partner, are on maternity, paternity or adoption leave, or you're unable to work because you are disabled or have caring responsibilities, you could still be eligible.

You **can't** get 30 hours free childcare if **either** you, or your partner, each **individually** expect to earn £100,000 or more.

How to apply.

Go to childcarechoices.gov.uk

You will receive a unique code which you must bring into school along with your National Insurance number and the child's birth certificate.

If places are available your child can start in their childcare place the term after they turn 3 years old and only if you have received a valid 30 hours code, **whichever is later**.

Important

To keep your 30 hours free childcare place you need to reapply every 3 months directly to HMRC. School/nursery is not involved in this part of the process and places may be lost if you fail to reapply.
