Support your child in recognising repeating patterns with these **Repeating Patterns Peg Cards**. You could use

clothes pegs, sticky tack, counters or just get your child to point at the picture that completes the pattern. Can they make their own? Find lots of pairs of socks. Lay them together in their pairs and use them to help your child to practise counting in twos.

Extra Activities



Have a child that enjoys colouring? These adorable **Colouring Pages** feature the animals from the story

and are a great way to continue your child's learning! Can they name all of the animals?



Fancy burning off some energy? These Animal Moves Posters are a fun way to get children

exercising and moving around. You could find some animal noises on the Internet to accompany your child's animal antics!

- Can you find any objects in your home that rhyme? Make a list of them!
- Talk about telling lies and whether it is ever OK. Is it a good thing to always tell the truth?
- Play 'Pass the Rhyme' take turns saying words that rhyme until you can't think of any more!
- Research and find out some information about the animals in the story. You could look in a book or online.
- Have a go at retelling the story. Can you and your child add any actions to help remember it? Maybe you could make noises or movement to remember the order of the animals!
